SUMMARY AND OBJECTIVES

This course is a general introduction to social research methods and will cover three broad topics: the foundations of social science, research design and data collection. In discussing each topic, we will also consider the ethical implications of social research. Social research is a craft, and like any other craft, it takes practice to do it well. Therefore our approach will be hands-on from the start. You will have opportunities to *learn by doing* in all aspects of the course – in class meetings and out-of-class assignments. By the end of the course you should be able to:

1. Formulate good research questions and design appropriate research
2. Collect your own data using a variety of methods
3. Analyze both qualitative and quantitative data
4. Critically evaluate your own research and that of other social scientists
5. Use SPSS ... Statistical Package for the Social Sciences

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

Detailed descriptions of the assignments will be given out in class and posted on blackboard. For every day a MAJOR assignment is late, I will deduct 5 points from the grade. I do not accept late homework or allow students to make up missed quizzes.

ATTENDANCE

The University requires class attendance. I will allow 3 “free” (unexcused) absences over the course of the semester without penalty. More than 3 unexcused absences will result in a 3 point deduction per absence in your final course grade. The university mandates that 5 or more unexcused absences will result in an F grade for the course.

The following and only the following absences are eligible to be excused: Religious holidays, as specified in FSU policy; absences due to representing FSU at official functions, including intercollegiate debating or varsity sports events; verified emergencies and/or medical illness. Medical illnesses are serious in nature and require continued treatment by medical professionals and/or surgical or other treatments.

Colds, the flu, fatigue, and stress do not qualify as medical illnesses. If you have a chronic illness that could affect your attendance, it is imperative that you alert me to this at the beginning of class. Documentation for an absence to be excused is required. Documentation must be provided upon your return to class. If documentation is not provided on the first day back from the absence, the absence will NOT be excused. Please provide a copy of the documentation to me and keep a copy for your own records. While one is not penalized for the absence of excused absences, he or she remains responsible for all content missed, including assignments, knowledge, or skills that were covered in the missed class(es).

****If you come in late to class, leave early, sleep in class or disrupt class in any way ... you will be counted absent for that day ... no exceptions! If you are not in class when attendance is taken, you will be counted absent, even if you come to class at a later time. If you leave before class ends, you will be counted absent, even if your presence was recorded at the beginning of class.

Finally, students in the course will be held to the highest standards of academic integrity. Any form of academic dishonesty will result in a "zero" for that particular assignment or possibly an "F" for the course and may be reported to the University Judicial Office. Cheating and plagiarism will not be tolerated.

CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR

Courtesy in the Classroom. Classroom courtesy is necessary to ensure that all students have the opportunity to learn without distractions. This means no cell phones or text messaging, listening to ipods or talking during lectures (unless recognized by the professor or discussion leader), reading newspapers, etc. during class. **DO NOT TEXT MESSAGE.** Any of the aforementioned behavior will result in being counted absent.

If you must have a cell phone to receive emergency calls about kids or other family members, keep it on vibrate. Entering and leaving is distracting to your instructor and other students. **Therefore, you need to be on time for class and stay until the end.** If you must enter late or leave early, please inform me before class begins and take the seat nearest an exit and enter or leave as quietly as possible. Please make sure the door does not 'bang' as you enter or leave. Repeated disruption of class may lead to penalties that reduce your final grade (see below). Class discussions of the issues we study can stimulate strong feelings and heated debate. Because this is a college classroom, all discussions must be scholarly.

(1) Scholarly comments are:

Respectful of diverse opinions and open to follow up questions and/or disagreement; related to the class and course material; advance the discussion about issues related to the

course and/or course material rather than personal beliefs; are delivered in normal tones and a non-aggressive manner.

(2) Unacceptable behaviors in the classroom are:

(a) Personal attacks. This includes attacks on a person's appearance, demeanor, or political beliefs. (b) Interrupting your instructor or other students. Raise your hand and wait to be called on by the discussion leader or myself to prevent this problem. (c) Using the discussion to argue for political positions and/or beliefs. If political discussions arise, they must be discussed as scholarly endeavors (see above). (d) Using raised tones, yelling, engaging in arguments with other students, and being physically aggressive. (e) Ignoring your instructor's authority to protect the integrity of the classroom. Anyone who violates these guidelines will be asked to cease and desist and may be asked to leave the classroom and/or drop the course.

Failure to abide by these principles can result in academic penalties ranging from a lowered grade, being counted absent, to dismissal, to failing the course.
